"If It Be God's Will..."

In the fifth chapter of his Letter to the Romans, Paul spoke these words which continue to resonate in our own time:

³ Not only that, but we also boast in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, ⁴ endurance produces character, and character produces hope. (Romans 5: 3-4)



It is in this hope that we are trying (again!) to think about what will be necessary to again gather for worship face to face. The Session of Trinity Church has put it this way, "IF it be God's will, and IF it is safe to do so, we will endeavor to resume public worship, with restrictions, no earlier than September 1st, 2020. We will be asking that all worshippers agree to the following Covenant:

As members of a family of faith founded upon love for God and neighbor, we covenant to act in such a way that we consistently put the needs of others above our own personal wishes. In embracing this covenant, we agree to practices of mutual concern which follow the Session's recommended guidelines for reopening (e.g. staying home when our own health is compromised, wearing masks, practicing regular hand sanitation, and observing appropriate social distance both within worship and during times before and after).

In order to be as SAFE as possible, we will be following the Guidelines below:

- Limit on-site worship to no more than 50 persons per service.
- Encourage everyone to make wise personal choices about whether they are well enough to be in a public worship setting.
- Provide and/or require face masks and hand sanitizing as appropriate.
- Practice physical distancing everywhere on the church property.
- Use the provided Communion pre-packaged packets in worship.
- Utilize a basket or other container at the main doors for offerings.
- Do not sing, use hymnals or use church bulletins.
- Postpone the use of greeters, paper nametags, traditional passing the peace and microphone during "joys and concerns".
- Consider multiple Sunday or other weekday services to reduce service size.
- Postpone Trinity 30 and other food and beverage related activities.
- Postpone the giving and distribution of weekly sanctuary flowers.
- The Choir will be composed of our section leaders.
- Limit or re-format memorials outside in Columbarium services, indoor weddings and other such events (Zoom where possible).
- Postpone pastor receiving lines at doors following services.
- Continue to conduct live or pre-recorded on-line video worship services.
- Review church insurance policies for legal risk factors and limitations.

While we would not use greeters, we will continue to need ushers to assist people with locating appropriate seating.

In order to assure that we stay within the numerical guidelines, we will need to ask people to "make reservations" for their intended worship attendance.

note from the associate pastor...

During this strange season of hard decisions, a few verses from Psalm 19 have been on my mind:

The heavens are telling the glory of God; and the firmament proclaims his handiwork.

Day to day pours forth speech, and night to night declares knowledge. There is no speech, nor are there words; their voice is not heard;

yet their voice goes out through all the earth, and their words to the end of the world.

Nations, governments at all levels, school systems, businesses, hospitals and other health care providers, congregations, families, individuals: at all levels, and seemingly all at once, we earthlings are facing hard decisions—all because of a submicroscopic piece of genetic material and protein. To "open up" or stay "closed"; to go to work, risking exposure to the coronavirus, or to stay home; to do school in-person or remotely; to send your kids to school or not; to take that extended-family vacation or not. The decisions keep coming, and the underlying facts keep changing—if you're like me, you're feeling, frankly, paralyzed, at least in some ways.



All of this has caused me to do some thinking about how weighing these decisions intersects with faith. We Christians rightly think of the Bible as a place to go for answers. And yet if you think the Bible has answered the question of whether it's currently safe to hold in-person church services or to send your kids to school, then I'm afraid you may be confusing the Bible with a Magic-8-Ball

The Bible does have answers—or rather, the one big answer—in its witness to the grace of God in Jesus Christ. And our faith should certainly inform our thinking when it comes to the big decisions in our lives, COVID-19-related or not.

But it's also worth remembering that faith in God is ultimately a holy mystery, one aptly encapsulated by the beautiful, if slightly confounding, words of Psalm 19. And, as the heavens and the earth tell "the glory of God" by their very existence, let us glorify God in our decision-making by drawing on the many gifts God has given us: intelligence, compassion, scientific and medical expertise, and plain old good sense.

session notes:

The Session held its regular meeting by Zoom on July 27, 2020. Rev. Mark Stanley led us in an opening prayer. Additional meetings were also held on June 29 and July 13 to make decisions regarding the Covid-19 pandemic.

We noted with sorrow the passing of Ginny Arkens on July 14, 2020.

As Pamela Campbell has moved, we held a meeting of the Board of Directors on June 29, to elect a new president of the Corporation of Trinity Presbyterian Church. We elected Ed Spencer, who had previously been serving as vice president, president and Molly Garnett vice president.

At each of the meetings, Ed Spencer shared the report of the re-opening task force. He indicated they are looking at both science and data in monitoring the situation with the Covid-19 pandemic. He noted that the task force has been in contact with the Worship Ministry, and has invited several members of the Worship Ministry to serve on the task force. It was also noted that, if individuals would like to share a Minute for Mission or to read the scripture, it is possible to include those in the recorded church services.

Ed Spencer presented a motion from the task force, which Session approved, that we revise the current reopening statement to the following: If it be God's will, the Trinity Presbyterian Church building will not open prior to September 1.

Ed additionally presented the motion from the reopening task force that we allow the WNC Presbytery's outdoor youth activity to be held outside at Trinity on September 27, with 15-20 youth participating, and Session approved.

Judi Weeter noted that the Worship Ministry has discussed in detail the step one recommendations of the Re-Opening task force. Session approved the motion she presented from the re-opening task force, that we incorporate a theological covenant in the Re-opening plan, which each person attending in-person services would agree to.

Presbytery is being held by Zoom this July. Kathryn Forsythe moved that we elect Ron Howard and Julie Carter commissioners to Presbytery. Session approved.

Jim Smelker shared the report of the Stewardship, and presented a motion on behalf of the Finance and Stewardship Ministry. His motion contained details of the plans for the Stewardship Campaign, including options dependent on whether or not public worship has resumed by mid-September, which Session approved.

Diane Bowers shared the Finance report. She noted that, because of the irregularity of work due to the Covid virus, we have been paying our choir section leaders as if they were working a full schedule. She moved, on behalf of the Finance/Stewardship Ministry, and Session approved, the following: Now that choir section leaders are back at work on a regular basis, approve returning to paying choir section leaders for rehearsals/performances actually worked.

Mark Stanley asked about the use of the Trinity building. Several members have asked about groups meeting in the church. There was some discussion about the risks involved with sizable groups. It was additionally noted that Session has previously approved keeping the building closed until at least September 1.

Ron Howard shared the report of the Preschool Board, and presented two motions, both of which Session approved. The first motion is: The Trinity Presbyterian Church Preschool will remain closed through the end of 2020 due to health and safety concerns related to COVID-19 for staff, children, parents and others and a decision to open in January 2021 will be made at a called meeting of the Trinity Preschool Board in November prior to Thanksgiving.

The second motion approved by Session regarding the Preschool is: The Trinity Presbyterian Church Preschool Yard Sale will be postponed until spring of 2021 due to health and safety concerns related to COVID-19 for staff, volunteers and customers. Collections for the yard sale will no longer take place in 2020. A future date for the yard sale will be determined when health and safety issues related to COVID-19 are no longer present.

Glenn Walker shared information about how the Hunger Walk will be conducted remotely this year, and move that we **a**llow the collection of donations and distribution of t-shirts for the Hunger Walk, which is being held remotely, outside on August 30, and either outside or inside on September 6 and 13, depending on whether the building is open. Session approved.

Rev. Dwight Christenbury closed each meeting with prayer.

Session is continuing to meet every two weeks to make decisions regarding the Covid-19 pandemic.

Preschool News

Given the uncertain times in which we live, the Trinity Preschool Board unanimously agreed not to open the Trinity Preschool for the remainder of 2020. This decision was based on several factors: safety and health concerns related to COVID-19 for staff, children, parents and others; concerns expressed by staff, including family commitments which may preclude some from returning this fall; apparent reluctance on some parents from deciding to send their children to the preschool due to health and safety concerns based on very low number of applications received; and decisions made by local school boards. Obviously, virtual learning is not an option for preschools.

Secondly, the Trinity Preschool Board agreed to postpone the annual Yard Sale until sometime in the spring of 2021 when health and safety issues related to COVID-19 are no longer present. Collections for the Yard Sale are suspended for 2020.

The Trinity Presbyterian Church Session unanimously approved both motions.

Handmade "Plarn" Sleep Mats

My interest in recycling led me to discover the world of plarn. Plarn is handmade yarn made from plastic grocery bags looped together (plastic + yarn = plarn).

During this time of staying at home I have been collecting plastic bags (thanks to all my donors!), cutting them into strips, creating balls of plarn and using it to crochet a durable, water-resistant, portable sleeping mat for someone in need.

When I think about how many plastic bags are thrown away each year (Earth Day Network estimates 100 billion bags – about 371 per person!) it just makes sense to find more ways to repurpose them.

The homeless population is growing and making a sleeping mat using an estimated 700 bags for each mat seems like a win/win to me.

There are volunteer groups around the country who are using plarn to create mats for the homeless. It would be great to have a group to plarn with, but for now this is a solitary project for me. Even those who don't crochet can be involved in this project. Bags need to be collected, they need to be cut into strips and looped to create the plarn. Financial Update

Compared to budget, our June income was lower but expenses were also lower so we ended with a net favorable month. On a YTD basis our bottom line is still favorable to budget and to 2019 through June.

Our pledge income was almost \$11,000 lower than the budgeted average. This was expected due to some members paying their entire pledge in earlier months.

Local Mission expense was higher than budget because Session approved bringing their YTD spending back up to budget levels (catching up on earlier deferrals). The Board of Pensions has waived Mark's pension/medical payments for three months. We have booked two of those adjustments with the final credit expected in July.

IAM Match Program---Good News!

- Donations received since program announced thru 6/30 \$13,571
- Trinity Match \$\$ delivered to IAM \$12,000
- Member donations directly to IAM prior to match program \$2,525
- Total Donations Through Trinity to IAM = \$28,096


