

Trinity's Summer Schedule (Hypothetically Speaking!)

I am going to go out on a limb. In the legal world, when people want to discuss something that MIGHT happen, but has not yet taken place, they sometimes speak in terms of "hypothetical possibilities." I am going to do just that and here's why: The Re-opening Task Force has made a number of proposals for the Session to consider. The Session doesn't meet until next Tuesday, June 8th, and we really want for the membership of Trinity to know what's going on without having to wait until July for that information. Therefore, I am going to share with YOU what might happen, once it has received approval from the Session: So Stay Tuned!

Proposals: (To be placed before the Session on June 8th)

1. Beginning on June 9th, the Church Office will be OPEN on a regular basis.
2. Beginning on June 9th, All meeting spaces will be OPEN and available.
3. Beginning on Sunday, June 13th, Everyone is invited (and encouraged!) to return to Worship (You will no longer need to sign up in advance or limit attendance.)
4. Beginning on Sunday, June 13th, we will resume Hymn Singing, but with masks. (To be clear, you will only need to wear a mask while singing hymns.)
5. Beginning on June 9th, we will begin allowing outside groups to make reservations to use the church building and grounds.
6. Until at least July, we will NOT be using the Trinity Kitchen to cook food. The kitchen may be used as a "prep area" for snacks and pre-prepared foods.
7. We will be continuing to provide "digital worship."
8. We will continue to request that all persons who have not been fully vaccinated, please wear masks at ALL times.
9. IF you have a compromised immune system or prefer to wear a mask, PLEASE feel free to wear a mask!

Finally, I know that this does not answer ALL of your questions, but hopefully it can provide us with a useful starting point. Let me know if you have any questions or concerns. I am excited about seeing each and every one of you in the weeks ahead!

note from the associate pastor...

Some of you asked about a word, *nakba*, that I used in a prayer I offered in worship on May 16, in the context of the Israel-Palestine conflict. *Nakba* is an Arabic word meaning “catastrophe,” and for the past 73 years it has been applied specifically to the forced removal of many thousands of Palestinian Arabs from their homes and land when the present-day state of Israel was established in 1948. Since 1998, Nakba Day has been an official, annual observance on May 15. (The full version of the Nakba Day prayer that I excerpted, by the American rabbi Brant Rosen, can be found here:

Israel and Palestine have, of course, dominated the news in recent weeks, emphasizing the reality that the *nakba* was not a one-time occurrence but that it continues to the present day. It's become almost a cliché that the situation in the Holy Land is “complicated.” While that's certainly true—the conflict, after all, involves an explosive combination of history, politics, war, international law, and religion—it's also not impossible to become educated about what's going on.

I know from conversation that many of you are pretty well-informed about the issues surrounding Israel-Palestine, but none of us know all there is to know. If you'd like to learn more, here is a short list of books and organizations that, while limited, at least makes for a good start:

- *Israel/Palestine (Hot Spots in Global Politics)* by Alan Dowty (A straightforward, somewhat academic history of the conflict; new editions are published every so often, but this book will almost always be out of date. Still, it provides excellent background.)
- *Blood Brothers: The Dramatic Story of a Palestinian Christian Working for Peace in Israel* by Elias Chacour and David Hazard (Fr. Chacour is a priest in the Melkite Greek Catholic Church and an educator who was born in a Palestinian village in the upper Galilee region; he and his family were expelled from their home when the village was occupied in 1948. His book is gripping, highly readable, and hopeful.)
- *The Lemon Tree: An Arab, a Jew, and the Heart of the Middle East* by Sandy Tolán (The true story of the unlikely, decades-long friendship between a Palestinian man and the Jewish woman whose family moved into his house in 1948.)
- *Apeirogon* by Colum McCann (A recent novel based on the real-life friendship of a Palestinian and an Israeli who have both lost children to the conflict but unite in a shared view that the Israeli occupation of Palestine must end. Though their story has been fictionalized, this gripping novel is based firmly in reality.)

session notes:

The Session held its stated meeting by Zoom on May 10. Ron Howard shared a devotion and prayer by St. Francis of Assisi.

We noted with sorrow the passing of Alice Gant on April 26, 2021 and of Bob Moser on May 3, 2021.

Ron Howard brought the news that, after much prayerful consideration and discussion, the Trinity Preschool Board has made the difficult unanimous recommendation to the Session that the school be discontinued effective immediately. The Preschool Board brought a motion to Session with that recommendation, and with detailed plans for using the remaining funds in a manner consistent with the original wishes of the donors---that they be used for the education and development of young children. Session passed this motion.

Session passed an additional related motion that, given the closure of the Trinity Preschool, we will discontinue the Trinity Preschool Yard Sale effective immediately. Any

current donations will be sent to the Black Mountain Childrens' Home.

Session also passed the motion brought by Diane Bowers for the Finance Ministry to establish a Matching Funds Grant of \$25,000 to match donations made through Trinity Presbyterian Church, PCUSA by Trinity Members and Friends and designated for IAM and/or Fuente de Vita/Guatemala Scholarship Fund.

Rev. Dwight Christenbury shared the motion from the Christian Nurture Ministry, which Session passed, that we approve Trinity hosting this year's Community Vacation Bible School (VBS), June 21-24, 2021. COVID-19 precautions will be observed at all times. All VBS activities will take place outdoors, with a few exceptions.

Session also passed a motion to permit Civitan to have a box lunch brought in for their July meeting.

Alice Lucille Gantt - 7/6/1922 - 4/26/2021

Alice Gantt, 98, died on Monday, April 26, 2021. A native of St. Thomas, ND, Alice Swenson graduated as her high school valedictorian in 1938. Alice attended business school in Grand Forks, ND prior to moving to Washington, DC to support her ailing aunt. While there, Alice was employed as an auditor at National Security and Trust Company located catty-corner from the White House. After the end of WWII, Alice met the love of her life, John Gantt, an Army veteran, and employee at the National Archives. They were wed in St. Thomas, ND in July 1948. Shortly thereafter, they moved to Berkeley, CA. While there, Alice was a receptionist at Allied Wood Products.

In 1953, she gave birth to their first son, Steve. In 1954, the family moved to Ann Arbor, MI. In 1957, Alice gave birth to their second son, Bob. Alice excelled as a homemaker and mother for the next eighteen years while working from home as a transcriptionist for the University of Michigan. In 1985, Alice and John retired and then moved to Laurel Park in 1986. Alice was a Meals on Wheels and Friends of the Library volunteer. Alice always enjoyed connecting with family and friends. She loved crafting. She was an avid card player, belonging to several playing groups.

Alice is survived by her children, Steve and Bob, and her grandchildren, Eleanor, Justin, Jessica, and Melissa.

Bobby Leonard Moser 12/28/1935 - 5/4/2021

Hendersonville - Bobby "Bob" Leonard Moser, of Hendersonville, North Carolina, passed away suddenly on May 4th, 2021. He was born on December 28, 1935, at the family home in Matthews, NC because the roads were impassable due to a snowstorm that evening. When Bob was 18 months old, he was diagnosed with polio. For the rest of his life, he battled with the effects but never let the handicap slow him down.

Bob graduated from the University of Georgia in 1959, where he was an integral part of the golf team's success. He was honored to be chosen as the team captain in his senior year of college. Bob won many collegiate golf tournaments, including the SEC individual championship, and was named to the NCAA All-American team. After college, Bob met his lovely wife, Cynthia in Warm Springs, Georgia, where they both were working at the time. After a whirlwind romance, they married in Charleston, West Virginia in 1961, and had two children, Steve and Mary Ann. Bob and Cynthia were married for 60 wonderful years.

Bob was a golf pro at many prestigious country clubs, including Echo Lake in New Jersey, The Everglades Club in Palm Beach, and DeBordieu in Pawleys Island. He was fortunate to play many of the best golf courses in America, including his favorite Augusta National. Throughout his life he had continued competitive success winning numerous local golf tournaments, and was fortunate to spend 41 years doing what he loved best - being a golf pro. Later in life, he switched careers and became a successful Realtor in the western NC area, another job that he thoroughly enjoyed.

As Cynthia's mother "Mo" grew older, Bob doted on her constantly and helped to make her golden years in Myrtle Beach, SC special. Bob also loved to trout fish in the beautiful North Carolina mountain streams, had a life-long passion for trailer camping in state and national

parks across the country, played a mean game of doubles tennis with his wife, and also devoted his time making great memories with his family at the beach and in the mountains.

Bob is survived by his wife, Cynthia; their two children, Steve Moser of Jacksonville Beach, Florida, and Mary Ann Cronley of Atlanta, GA, and his four granddaughters, Angela Kitchin of New Bern, NC, Taylor Moser of Gulfport, FL, Charlotte Cronley of Atlanta, GA; and Camille Cronley of Atlanta, GA.

OPTIONS FOR SESSION CONSIDERATION

After much prayerful consideration and discussion, the TPS Board has made the difficult unanimous recommendation to the Session that the preschool be discontinued effective immediately.

Reasons for the Board's decision included;

- the need to hire a preschool director following the resignation of Beth Erber (who had planned on resigning months ago unrelated to the proposed closing of the preschool);
- need to hire at least one teacher;
- feedback from prospective parents saying they need a full day preschool program;
- the uncertainty of the number of children who would enroll given the continuing concerns of the pandemic; and financial concerns.

The Session unanimously approved the TPS Board's motion at the May 10 Session meeting after an emotionally charged discussion regarding the success of the TPS program.

The TPS Board has responsibility for several remaining funds and the Board strongly feels that these funds be used in a manner consistent with the original wishes of the donors—that they be used for the education and development of young children. These funds will be combined into one fund entitled the "Child Benevolent Fund". A Child Benevolent Fund Committee will be established to provide oversight of this fund and will act as a subcommittee of our Local Missions Ministry. Future quarterly endowment funds will be deposited into the new fund. The Eller Residential Child Care Center at the Black Mountain Home for Children and Families has been identified as the recipient of ten percent of the December 31st balances each year. Other disbursements from the funds would be considered on the request of local agencies if the requests are consistent with the fund's objectives.

On a related issue, the Session also unanimously approved the TPS Board motion to discontinue the preschool yard sale due to the closing of the preschool. Contents of the box car will be distributed to the Black Mountain Home for Children and Families for their thrift store (excluding the items already earmarked for Thrive's homeless initiative). Any goods not needed by the Black Mountain Home would go to other local agencies. The current balance in the Yard Sale Fund and future Books for Good sales will be redirected to the Global Mission Ministry to be used in Guatemala. Oversight of the funds will be handled by the Guatemala Committee.

Trinity has been able to redirect funds from other budgeted areas to establish another matching grant program, this time for \$25,000.00. The fund will match your donations dollar for dollar to Interfaith Assistance Ministry (IAM) and/or to Fuente de Vida and the Guatemala Scholarship Fund.

Trinity has long supported IAM in its mission to provide emergency relief to Henderson County residents who are experiencing financial crises and last year established a \$15,000.00 matching grant which earned over \$30,000.00 for IAM.

As the pandemic lingers and more and more Henderson County families have critical financial needs. "As the largest nonprofit provider of crisis services and basic needs assistance in Henderson County, Interfaith Assistance Ministry provided more than 26,000 service touches in 2020," said Elizabeth Willson Moss, Executive Director. "IAM helps reduce hunger by providing nutritious grocery orders to our neighbors in need. IAM helps prevent new homelessness by providing assistance with rent. IAM helps keep the lights and keep you warm in the winter and cool in the summer when you don't know where to turn for help. IAM helps struggling families clothe their children and put shoes on their feet. We couldn't support so many in great need without the donations of our generous community. Thank you Trinity Presbyterian!"

The situation in Guatemala is even more dire. According to Carole Ball, "The presence of the pandemic and the inability to work in Guatemala has left many parents unable to provide food for their family much less afford the

expense of sending their children to school. Now more than ever before scholarship support is imperative if poverty is to be eradicated in Guatemala. Please give prayerful thought to saving the future of the children by giving scholarship help at this time where the amount you give is matched through this grant."

Financial Update

April 2021 results

Our bottom line through April remains better than budget, but is now slightly below 2020. Both years saw strong giving through April. Again, some donations cover our members' annual pledges so we can't expect every month to be as strong as January through April.

April pledge receipts were a little below average. We are now running \$20,000 above the monthly budgeted average for pledge receipts but about \$30,000 behind last year through April. Plate and Unpledged income are above both budget and 2020 levels.

Total Expenses continue to be under budget. Electricity is running \$500 below budget for the year so far. The balance in our Capital accounts is \$40,000 after paying for our roof repairs.

Rob Tolleson Fund JOY OF JAZZ SCHOLARSHIPS

Long-time members of Trinity Presbyterian Church remember the establishment of the Trinity Music Center in 2013. Established as a ministry of the church, its outreach was to provide music lessons and instruments to young people of our church and the community. Most of the lessons were free, except for the adults, who participated in group lessons. Fortunately for our church, Dick Bobb, Don Widmeyer, Glenn Walker, Charles Keever, Kathy Madigan, et.al., decided NOT to pursue professional music careers as a result of their lessons with the Music Center.

This ministry became a 501c3 in 2015. Now, known as the Hendersonville Community Music Center, it operated with much the same mission as before: providing music education and lessons to the underserved. In 2016, Trinity member, Rob Tolleson, became HCMC's director. Under

Rob's leadership, HCMC developed strong ties with Henderson County's Boys & Girls Club, as well as local schools. Existing music programs were enhanced and new programs were developed. Additionally, HCMC received several grants, notably from the Community Foundation. HCMC's influence with the community expanded.

Sadly, Rob passed away in June 2019. Even though friends of Robin from the music world, the church and the community stepped forward with donations amounting to \$9,000, HCMC was unable to sustain itself. HCMC was dissolved in 2020, just prior to the pandemic. Remaining monies from the Rob Tolleson donations, became a gift to be, maintained by the church as Rob Tolleson Joy of Jazz Fund. These funds will be used to share Rob's love of Jazz with young people.

On May 28, James Tolleson (son), will present two \$500 scholarships to HHS graduating seniors who have been faithful members of the HHS Jazz Band for four years. These students are Sophie Tanker and Clara Hockenberry.
