

PASTOR'S CORNER

There is a Church sign on West 64 that says simply, "God is Good." I drive past it quite frequently and often find myself meditating on this message. A couple of months ago I was driving past the sign with my wise wife and youngest daughter in the car. It seemed like an appropriate occasion to engage in a

bit of theological discourse. I asked them if they saw this message and then asked if they remembered the popular slogan from some years ago, "God is Good... All the Time!, All the Time... God is Good!" It made a dandy sort of call and response cheer, especially at youth conferences, and for that matter, at adult Church conferences as well. A few of my colleagues throw it out fairly regularly to spice up group events. It may even have been used at a few Presbytery meetings. A veritable Pep Rally!

Here's my question: Is it appropriate, or even accurate, to go around shouting that "God Is Good... All The Time?" I'm not trying to go to the theological dark side, I just wonder what drives so many of us to need to make this declaration. In a world of sin and injustice and sickness and death and the Holocaust and pediatric cancer and war and mass shootings, I guess I want to know what right we have to make such a claim... and to do it so darned cheerfully. It isn't so much that I doubt God's goodness, as I doubt our right to be glib about it. If God is good, then that goodness is taking place against a tragic and painridden backdrop, and we shouldn't forget it!

Maybe that's what people have in mind when they celebrate God in this way. Maybe I'm making this too complicated. Maybe I would benefit from a simpler kind of faith. But it isn't simple for me, and I'm betting that it isn't simple, or even especially easy for you either. Help me out with this: I shout, "God is Good!," and then you shout: "Yes, that's true, but it isn't so simple! We are a people who declare that God's power can and will ultimately triumph over a broken and fallen world, but it will be a long and pain-filled process filled with mystery and drama, only fully understood and authored by The One True God!"

Just As 2021 Montreat Middle School Conference

The Session held its stated meeting by Zoom on June 8. Diane Bowers shared a devotion and led us in an opening prayer.



We noted with sorrow the passing of Doris Klimach on May 25, 2021.

Duane Johnson presented the report of the Technology Committee, with a recommendation for the installation of a video system in the Trinity sanctuary, and the installation of a high speed internet service from Morris Broad-Session moved band. and passed a motion that this recommenda-

tion, as presented, be approved, and to authorize the use of funds from the Fred Van Itallie Technology Fund for the necessary equipment plus installation.

Steve Culp brought a motion from the Endowment Committee to accept a Gift to Trinity Presbyterian Church. with recommendations for the investments of the Gift's endowment portions. Session approved the motion unanimously.

Ed Spencer and Fitz Sthreshley brought, and Session approved, a motion from the Administration/Personnel Ministry to approve a proposal to repurpose and rent downstairs unused rooms to Non-profit Organizations. They presented a plan detailing a joint project bringing together representatives from the Trinity Administration/Personnel Ministry, Building and Grounds Ministry, former Pre-school Board member, Treasurer, Administrative Assistant, Building Use Coordinator and Pastor for that purpose.

Ed Spencer presented the report of the Re-Opening Task Force, and moved that Session approve the following: opening of the church office starting June 9, opening of all spaces for use for meetings, returning to full worship service attendance with no number restrictions, singing with the use of masks, continuing digital worship, continuing to disallow food until at least July, with the exception of memorial services and pre-prepared food, allowing the Hendersonville Swing Band to rehearse on the 2nd & 4th Sundays, allowing outside groups to make reservations for Grounds use requests, allowing those who are vaccinated to leave their mask off except for singing. Session approved this motion unanimously.

Molly Garnett presented the report of the Chrisitian Nurture Ministry, noting that there will be several youth from Trinity attending Camp Grier.

Jim Smelker presented the Stewardship Ministry's plan for this year's Stewardship campaign.

Ron Howard noted that the Nominating Committee has reformed and is beginning to consider Nominations for the next year.

Rev. Dwight Christenbury closed the meeting with prayer.

Session's next stated meeting will be August 9 at 6:30 via Zoom.

Financial Update

MAY 2021 RESULTS

Our bottom line through May is now slightly better than budget, but significantly below 2020 for the same time period.

May pledge receipts were the lowest so far this year. We are now running \$7,000 above the monthly budgeted average for pledge receipts but about \$55,000 behind last year through May. Plate and Unpledged income remain strong at \$11,000 above budget.

Total Expenses continue to be under budget. Electricity is running \$767 below budget for the year so far.

The balance in our Capital accounts is \$41,600 after paying for our roof repairs.

ENDOWMENTS MAKE A DIFFERENCE


Trinity Preschool was a mission of Trinity Presbyterian Church for 30 years or more. The purpose of this mission was to provide a Preschool experience for children of our congregation as well as for children in the Henderson County community. We were a resource for families who otherwise could not afford a Preschool experience for their children. We consistently had the lowest tuition rates in Henderson County. How were we able to do this? Through the benevolence of Trinity Presbyterian Church and generous donations by some individual members. With donations from Ginny Arkens, Alice Porter, Rebecca Palmer, Yard sale profits, Books for Good, Trinity Presbyterian Women, other appreciated one time donations, and the interest from our endowments, we were able to establish the Tuition Assistance Fund. This Fund enabled us to set a lower tuition rate for everyone, even lower rates for Trinity members, families with more than one child, and provide financial assistance with tuition to individual families as needed.

The money that remains in our Tuition Assistance Fund has been used to establish a Trinity Child Benevolent Fund. This fund will continue to grow each year because of three Endowments Trinity members have made to the Preschool. The Ebberts Endowment, the Ralph Deweff Endowment, and the Judy King Endowment will contribute an estimated \$2000 to \$2500 to our fund each year. Ten percent of our balance will be sent to the Eller House at the Black Mountain Home for Children and Families in December of each year. The Eller House is the residential facility that serves children 6 and under at the home. Also, money from this fund will be available to support children in Henderson County identified as needing, but unable to afford, a Preschool experience. We will provide funds to send the child to a local Preschool. We feel we are honoring the wishes of the people who donated this money, especially our endowment donors.

Without the financial support of the Trinity Congregation through donations, yard sales, and endowments, our preschool would never have been able to provide the valuable experience so necessary to children as they enter Kindergarten. We did a good job and TPC made it possible. The Trinity Preschool Board thanks the congregation for all the support we have been given, financial and in so many other ways. The Endowment Committee thanks the donors who contributed to the success of our preschool and encourages all Trinity members to consider making a difference in your area of particular interest at Trinity, or just to Trinity in general through an endowment. Endowments make a difference!


